JUNE 11TH MEETING



Journalist Gina Gillespie presented her experiences of living and writing in Afghanistan for seven and a half years after retiring from the Canadian military. She was part of group of international journalists who were hired by NATO to report on the different geographical areas of Afghanistan. The journalists worked in 14 groups, each of which included an international journalist and two Afghanistan journalists. Gina's was the only all-female group of journalists and they promoted women's rights, and visited the Afghanistan population in their homes and schools. The NATO group had their own news magazine and TV and the teams reported to Kabul from different parts of the country. The team lived at military bases and could accompany soldiers on missions. Gina lived on an American and an Italian base in West Afghanistan.

In Afghanistan, men and women have equal rights on paper, but the reality is very different. In a court of law, two women must testify to equal the testimony of one man. By law women do not marry until the age of 16 but child brides are very common. They can be bought and sold to settle family debts. A woman can't leave her house without being accompanied by a male relative, and it is hard for her to function without a husband or male relative. Rape is considered to be consensual and a woman can be jailed for adultery for rape. Women's shelters are considered to shelter "bad women". Women wear burqas and see it mainly as protection from men's attentions. Health care is very limited for women because a woman cannot see a male doctor and there are very few female doctors.

Women will sometimes try to commit suicide by pouring oil on themselves and setting themselves on fire

to escape the stress in their lives, and there is an International Burn Unit which takes care of these women. While it is important for girls to receive an education, there is also a risk of girls being burned with acid for attending school, and teachers can be killed as well. The average age of survival in Afghanistan is 45 years. Literacy rate is 43% for men and 13% for women. The only religion allowed is Islam and in villages local elders carry out the law as it has been for thousands of years. Now with international military forces leaving the country, there is even more concern about health, education, and women's rights.

Gina stressed the importance of the international community to support the building and protection of girls' schools. She spoke of a school that was built by an individual woman, Massuma, with great difficulty due to lack of support and government graft. However the school has now become a community centre where embroidery and other hand skills are taught to allow women to earn money for their families.

This was a most enlightening presentation which vividly portrayed conditions that are hard to grasp when we live in a free and democratic country such as ours.

BILLS' TRAVELS



The General appeared kind, warm hearted and selfless, and you could hear that in his voice as he spoke about the child-soldiers used in the wars in Africa. The stories of rape, dismemberment, and destruction of villages were horrifying. Most of the world sits back and does nothing, and this apathy is what he is trying to change, especially where the children are concerned. We were left with terrifying images and much food for thought by this wonderful speaker.

For those newer members, and as a refresher for others, a word about Extravaganza itself. It started out as a Spring Fling involving the clubs in Kawartha and Northumberland Counties. The last meeting held in Peterborough attracted about 2000 people. It was getting too big and a little out of hand, so the Northumberland County Clubs broke away and started the Extravaganza (we weren't allowed to use the name Spring Fling).

Planning for Extravaganza 2015 began at our first meeting in March 2014. The meeting was conducted by two members of the Extravaganza 2013 committee who offered us pointers for when we took over the 2015 event. At that time the committee was comprised of the VPs of all the Northumberland Clubs and we had six of eight clubs participating in the planning. Eventually Trent Hills and Presqu'ile took part as well. Meetings were held every month in 2014 until winter, and resumed in April 2015. By June 2015 everything came together, and by all measures this year's meeting was a huge success. A big thank you to all those involved in making this happen.


And you know, clothing manufacturers are less civilized these days. Why else would they start labeling a size 10 or 12 as an 18 or 20? Do they really think no one notices?
